On Wednesday, April 10, 2024 the 30th Annual Academic Awards Breakfast and Program took place at the New Richmond High School.



The Academic Awards Program has 3 award levels based on semester grade point average; Letters are earned after three (3) semesters of a GPA of 3.5 or higher; Pins are earned after five (5) semesters; and Medallions after seven (7) semesters.

This year we recognized 186 recipients. 91 students received the academic letter; 62 students received the academic pin; and 35 students received the academic medallion.

The Academic Awards Breakfast is usually viewed as the kick off to the "season" leading to graduation. Bella Baillargeon named Class of 2024 Valedictorian

When reflecting on her high school career, Bella Baillargeon shared that "it passed in the blink of an eye, and I wish I could relive some of my best moments." Having met great friends and learned valuable lessons throughout her school years, Bella will look back on them fondly. Bella is the daughter of Leah and Bob Baillargeon; she has a twin brother, Brady, and an older brother, Beau. Bella wanted to give a special mention to her cat, Leo, and her former dog, Chestnut. Bella credits her dad as the most influential person in her life, sharing that "he comes out to every sporting event and practice—he would coach me on softball and tennis, and he never complained."

Bella's participation in sports has been one of the highlights of her high school career. She has played softball and tennis all four years, and shares that being in sports "means you have friends everywhere." Her dedication and skill culminated in a significant achievement this year when she and Lily Brinkman clinched the sectional championship and made it to state for tennis—a testament to the talent and hard work Bella and Lily put in.



In addition to athletics, Bella has actively contributed to her school community as a Student-to-Student (STS) Mentor, even serving as a head mentor this year to her fellow STS mentors. She also served as a Spark Tutor for three years where she directly supported any students who wanted academic help, and she was a dedicated member of Key Club for the past three years.

Academically, Bella has challenged herself with rigorous coursework, including AP Language and AP Literature, UWRF Statistics, UWRF Chemistry, UWRF Calculus, and physics, preparing herself for future academic pursuits. She shares that "NRHS has provided opportunities to take higher level courses that can give me a head start for college. I have learned how to communicate with my peers and successfully manage my time." She is planning to attend the University of Wisconsin-Madison and major in the area of math or science. As Bella notes, Madison is a big school with excellent courses in both of those areas, so if she wants to switch her focus, there are plenty of options.

Bella's favorite pastime is reading, as she enjoys "getting the opportunity to rest and not be in a rush." Her favorite food is Jimmy John's #11 sandwich without tomatoes or lettuce, as she has a strong aversion to tomatoes. She finds joy in watching her favorite TV show, "Stranger Things," and listening to country music, which is her current favorite genre. Bella's pet peeve and fear is being late—she always tries to leave early and gets agitated if she has to wait on her brother or another family member.

Nathan is the son of Nicholas and Kathleen Bennig; he has a little brother Connor and a dog, Rusty. Nathan considers his uncle Trent, whom most people know as Mr. Bennig, as being the most influential person in his life as he has inspired Nathan to become a teacher himself. Nathan plans to attend the University of Wisconsin-River Falls in the fall to pursue a teaching degree.

As Nathan reflects on his high school experience, he shares that he has "grown into a more mature and well-rounded person who isn't afraid of putting himself out there." He shared that his freshman self was more selfish, and Nathan credits being able to face his overbearing anxiety as one of his greatest accomplishments in high school.

Nathan has pushed himself to be involved in numerous extracurriculars and rigorous academic courses. He has served as the secretary, vice



president, and president of the Computer Club. He has also been in jazz band and was involved in both Seussical the Musical and Chicago. As for sports, Nathan has dedicated his time to participating in powerlifting during his high school career. As Katelyn Doehrmann finishes her high school career, she wants to encourage students who will attend New Richmond High School in the fall to "not wish the time away and spend time doing things you like. It probably sounds hypocritical coming from a valedictorian, but don't worry so much about one quiz or test—you probably won't even remember them. As cliche as it sounds, live life to the fullest and make memories because that is what you will remember. Don't waste your time stressing."

Katelyn's parents are Carrie and Tony Doehrmann, and she has two brothers, Jacob and Nathan. She credits her family members as being the most influential people in her life because they have each helped her grow into a better person in their own unique way. Katelyn stated, "My mom shares my passion for creativity and I aim to be as humble, supportive, and compassionate as she is." Her dad taught her how to respect others, to respect the environment when they hunt and fish, and to respect herself by knowing her worth. Her older brother Jacob, who was also a valedictorian, is her role model for his mindset and intrinsic motivation, whereas her younger brother Nathan makes her laugh and teaches her how to have fun and be a little more carefree.



To say Katelyn was an involved student is an understatement. Throughout her years

at NRHS, Katelyn has been captain of cross country, captain of powerlifting, and a senior leader in track. You may also recognize her as our marching band drum major or from the marching band percussion section. She has supported other students as an STS mentor and was a "mentor-in-charge" her senior year. She was active in the Science Olympiad, Forensics, our high school musicals and school plays, Jazz Band, National Honor Society, Key Club, and Multicultural Club. Outside of school, she has taken firefighter training courses.

Academically, Katelyn has not shied away from challenges. Notably, she was one of two students to participate in a drone pilot certification course at NRHS. She has also taken AP Language, AP Literature, UWRF Calculus I, UWRF Calculus II, UWRF Psychology, UWRF Chemistry, and UWRF Statistics. Art is another passion of Katelyn's, and she has taken Illustrations, Advanced Drawing, Studio Art, and two independent study art courses to hone her skills.

Katelyn considers her high school experience "challenging but rewarding. Like life, it had its highs and lows, but I learned a lot and am a better person because of it." Her favorite part of high school has been making new friends in her sports and activities, and she considers her greatest achievement in high school as "becoming the role model that I looked up to and inspiring my peers." She credits NRHS for teaching her "to pursue what I love, to have discipline when completing difficult work, to be intrinsically motivated, and that while I probably shouldn't procrastinate as much as I do, I am pretty dang good at it." Next year, Katelyn is going to attend UW-Madison with a major somewhere in the STEM area.

In her free time, Katelyn enjoys reading, making art, listening to music, and watching TV with her family. Her favorite song is "Careless Whisper" by George Michael, and her favorite TV show is "Avatar the Last Airbender." Dave Domingo named Class of 2024 Valedictorian

Reflecting on his high school experience, Dave Domingo shares that he is thankful that the teachers at NRHS have prepared him to be successful after high school. Teachers have emphasized how to problem solve and have encouraged students to be curious about their learning. He states, "The work isn't a chore—the teachers take great care to help foster connections and be able to see a problem and pick it apart into smaller pieces. I also learned perseverance. If you don't understand something, there is no shame in asking for help. I was able to feel comfortable not knowing everything. Being smart isn't knowing everything; it's knowing when to ask for help." Dave also encourages students still in high school to go to as many school events as possible and believes attitude is everything when it comes to what you'll get out of your experiences. "If you go in thinking you won't have fun, you won't. If you go in thinking you will have fun, you will." He stresses that these high school events are finite—once an event like Homecoming is over, you can't get it back.

Dave is surrounded by a strong support system of family and friends. His parents are Gina and Edgar Domingo, and he has an older sister, Ruth. He credits his friends for the person he is today. "They inspire me to do my best because I want to make them proud, just as I want to make my parents and teachers proud."



Reflecting on his high school career, Dave stated that it was a great experience, even with COVID. He remembers his freshman year as being particularly fun, and throughout his four years at NRHS, he met a lot of great people. He appreciates being able to see his friends almost every day and is also appreciative of having wonderful teachers. During high school, Dave challenged himself by taking AP Biology, AP Literature, AP Language, AP Physics, UWRF Statistics, UWRF Calculus 1, and UWRF Calculus II. He also served as a Spark tutor, offering academic support to any student who requested it. Next year, Dave plans to attend the U of M-Twin Cities; he is enrolled in the College of Science and Engineering and is planning to major in Aerospace Engineering. When Dave was asked who he would be for a day if he could be anyone, it was very fitting when he shared he would be an astronaut "because I've always wanted to see the earth from space. Agriscience Happenings - By Rachel A. Sauvola, Agriscience Instructor

Three cheers for spring and growing many plants in the greenhouse! Thanks to all who have come to buy plants and all those who will still make purchases. All of the sales go into buying more plants and soil for next year. Thanks to the Plants, Animals, Pizza and More kids who worked so hard alongside Donny Buda, the Greenhouse Manager to make it all happen!

Learning about commodities in the state and nation led these students to try new things and share interesting information with their peers and community members. As they now master the economic chain reaction of food, they're seeing how food gets from the farm to the table in a whole new light.

Small Animal Science students have mastered the anatomy of canines, brought their cardboard dogs to the NRHS Dog Show and are now gearing up to have their live dogs brought to school to act as vet techs going over all the basic components of canine health and wellness to





ensure their animals are healthy. They recently had the opportunity to visit with 13 German Shorthaired Pointers in class. Mark and Tricia Schlicht allowed us to have them for animal behavior studies while also getting to socialize with them. Thank you for this opportunity that drew the whole school to the Agriscience room!

Large Animal Science students have been working hard at the farm to begin socializing our new baby calves, using the weigh tapes to gather benchmark data on size and stature. This will help us track overall growth in the weeks they are still together before summer begins. Then summer volunteers will take over the process.

Vet Science students have been studying diseases/ailments/illnesses for the species they have carried through the semester. One of my favorite labs is the feces extravaganza as they design feces using household kitchen materials to show how it looks when they have too much or too little of something in the diet and then of course what the feces look like normally. Studying the digestive system beforehand gave them a look at which type of system their species possessed.

They have also done an incredible job hatching baby chicks. Five teams each had a seven egg incubator and



this was the first year ever that one incubator hatched all seven of its eggs! It was like winning the lottery! That was especially true because all the eggs came from the school farm chickens so they weren't purchased! Our roosters are doing their job!



We also enjoyed hatching with each elementary school too. The second graders at Hillside and Paperjack did a great job and the Starr Elementary students enjoyed their incubator in the school library. Fun was had by all!

Now it's time to clean everything up and put it all away as the school year ends and summer begins. We sure hope you come to the SOAR Center to check on the chicks while school's out.
